The educated word is that a Newlands final would have secured the Mountain Goats a win. But three months of diligent campaigning by a Sharks team stung by their underperformance in the Super 14 have earned them the invaluable cushion of a home final. And 54 000 blackand-white bedecked Sharks fans are sure to give the Sharks their due after a wonderful rejuvenation.

However, Sharks coach John Plumtree said: "As much as we love our fans they will not win this match for us. We will have to raise our game from how we performed against the Bulls because in the final everything will be quicker and faster and everything needs to be much sharper."

If 1995 Currie Cup-winning golfing skills are anything to go by, then the omens are good for the Sharks.

For, the week of that game, and against the same opponents, Teichmann scored his first eagle on the golf course. And last week, he scored another.

However, with coach Ian Macintosh at the helm, a psychologist was brought in to help focus the team. Although this is common these days, back then it was unheard of.

Wahl Bartman, who captained the 1992 side that lifted the Currie Cup, said that just as his toam had underdogs on that day, so too were the Sharks tomorrow.

"We didn't think we'd win. but we prepared well and had belief in ourselves," he said.

"We had gone in as underdogs thinking we had no chance, but the guys were all so committed and prepared."

Bartman said that the Sharks could also emerge victorious if all the players also held that commitment.

Speaking from Ireland, where he plays for Ulster, Johann Muller, who captained the Sharks in their most recent Currie Cup win in 2008, said he was often in contact with the players, and the



BUSINESS tycoon Kenny Kunene has told Cosatu general secretary Zwelinzima Vavi to "go hang or go to hell" after the labour federation leader criticised Kunene's R700 000 weekend birthday party.

An unapologetic Kunene replied in a two-and-a-halfpage "open letter" to Vavi yesterday, saying Vavi had attacked him and his party because ANC Youth League president Julius Malema had been invited, and Vavi had not.

Kunene said Vavi would not be invited to the next party,

cause he recognises excellence from black business people and, unlike you, he does not condemn wealth indiscriminately". Kunene said. "He realises that the future greatness of this country lies in the hands of those of us willing to compete to be the best."

But Kunene said Vavi was "only too happy" to attend the R50 million wedding of businessman Robert Gumede last month.

Vavi told a Cosatu and civil society conference on Wednesday that lavish parties like Kunene's were "corrupting morality" and amounted to "spitting in the face of the poor", which made him "sick", Vavi said.

He also railed against sushi being served off the bodies of "half-naked ladies", but Kunene did not address this in his reply.

Kunene said he wanted to "correct your misapprehension that my party cost R700 000. It cost more".

He said he had made his money honestly and did not do business with the government. Kunene added that Vavi himself had had a "lavish wed-

ding two years ago, with horse-

In his letter, he said he had been in prison in the 1980s for "supporting the Struggle so

drawn carriages, no less".

that no one would be able to tell me how to live my life".

"If you care so much for the poor, then why don't you stop wearing your high-collar designer shirts, sell your house and live in a shack, and stop meeting in top-class restaurants to hold court on the suffering of the masses?

Kunene said he planned a "follow-up party" this weekend "for the underprivileged and poor, who are also part of my life, and always will be".
